Neighbour Day 2020 Theme: Social Connection

According to Relationships Australia, "Australia is in the midst of a loneliness crisis, with many in our population experiencing a deficit of social connection" hence the theme 'Social Connection' for the 2020 Neighbour Day celebrations and activities.

To help turn this around, Neighbour Day 2020 is focusing "on the importance of belonging – to start people thinking about how they can put their energy into creating positive and meaningful social connections with people outside of their normal groups and relationships." Regardless of if these are once- off interactions or the beginning of lasting relationships social connections encourage safer communities.

The theme for Neighbour Day this year is 'Social Connection' has stemmed from the "initial findings from Neighbour Day 2019 which indicate that after people hosted an event or took some neighbourly action, they experienced: an increased sense of identification with their neighbourhood; an increased sense of belonging; and perceived their neighbourhood environment more positively".

How Neighbour Day began:

Neighbour Day was founded in Melbourne, Australia in March 2003 by Andrew Heslop after the remains of an elderly woman were found inside her suburban home. Andrew Heslop is a community activist, social commentator and well known Australian.

Mrs Elsie Brown had been dead for two years – forgotten by her neighbours, her friends and her family. While Andrew did not know Mrs Brown he was shocked by the apparent ease in which the world had left her behind.

Widespread media interest followed and it was this coverage that prompted Andrew to suggest a 'National Check on Your Neighbour Day' in a Letter to the Editor of The Melbourne Age in 2003.

Since 2003, Neighbour Day has progressed from a reminder to connect with elderly neighbours to an annual celebration of strong communities and friendly streets. People of all ages participate because everyone everywhere is a neighbour no matter where you live nor your personal circumstances.

Not only do residents and office colleagues hold barbecues and street parties on front lawns and in the car parks of business areas to celebrate, councils and other local government bodies also hold major festivals and community

During her 32 years and 10 months of dedicated service Deb has achieved numerous awards including: Assistant Commissioner/Executive Director's Certificate (Corporate & Support) in 2006; Commissioner's Award for Excellence in Crime Prevention in both 2008 and 2009; Australian Police Medal in 2013 and Queensland Police Meritorious Service Medal in 2018 for her commitment and dedication to duty.

Whilst moving through the ranks: from Probationary in 27 April 1987; attaining her Detective Appointment on 25 January 1995 to Inspector 31 October 2011, Deb has worked in a variety of roles at various establishments and stations across the state including: Traffic Branch; Crime Operations Task Force; Maryborough Criminal Investigation Branch; Regional Education and Training; Crime Operations Branch, State Crime Operations Branch; Fraud and Corporate Crime Group; Ethical Practice Branch Command, Strategy and Performance, Ethical Standards Command and Professional Practice State Co-ordinator, Ethical Standards Command.









Deb has also worked on various programs to enhance the role of women in Policing,



representing the QPS on the international stage in Cardiff and Calgary as a member of the International Association of Women in Policing. It was apparent from all who spoke at the function that Detective Inspector Nicholson's due diligence, professionalism, leadership and friendly manner has meant she will be sorely missed by her work colleagues & the Service itself. 2

supporting: working bees, stock takes, unloading truck deliveries of CSP stock, sorting out stock at storage sheds and PHO. She was instrumental in CSP introducing the Constable T. Bear to our collection in 2012 and 2014 and continues to maintain the CSP Facebook page: updating it regularly with photos and posts for which we, being less tech savvy, are truly grateful.

The members of CSP look forward to continue working with Deb to support those who support us.

Deb has been an active member of the Blue Ribbon Committee donating

her time ensuring the ribbons are purchased, packaged and delivered to the Police Stations across the State, as well as assisting with the arrangements for the collection (ensuring QPS recruits and other volunteers are available at various locations) and banking the donations on National Police Remembrance Day.

Two new vessels join Water Police fleet (myPolice Oct 18, 2019)

Commissioner Katarina Carroll (APM) joined Honourable Mark Ryan, Minister for Police and Minister for Corrective Services, family and friends of the two fallen officers at the commissioning of QPS vessels named in their honour.

Minister Ryan said this was a very special day for the family and friends of Constable Lena and Detective Sergeant Kerlin and for the QPS Water Police.

Detective Sergeant Stewart Kerlin was tragically killed on duty on November 11 2006. The 20 metre multiple vehicle high speed barge

commissioned as Queensland Police Vessel (QPV) *Stewart Kerlin II* in honour of Detective Sergeant Kerlin, will service the Redlands and Moreton communities.

The 10 metre rigid inflatable monohull vessel commissioned as Queensland Police Vessel *Sondra Lena*, in honour of Constable Lena, will operate as a patrol vessel for the Water Police. Constable Sondra Lena who was tragically killed on duty on April 10 1992.

Commissioner Carroll said "these two vessels pay homage to Constable Lena and Detective Sergeant Kerlin and allow the Service to maintain their memory and recognise their service and sacrifice". Both vessels will enhance the Queensland Water Police with

improved capabilities, assisting officers by providing them with up-to- date and advanced technical support to best service the community.

Since their fit-out and completion of sea trails both the QPV Stewart Kerlin and the QPV Sondra Lena have been out and about responding to the bush fires on Stradbroke Island, used extensively in response to recent search and rescue operations and major weather events, thus providing assistance to the Southern Moreton Bay Island police and community.



Sue's Russian Caramel

Ingredients:

125 g butter
1 ³/₄ cups of brown sugar
1 tbls syrup
1 tin of condensed milk

Enjoy with a cuppa

Method:

Melt butter and sugar together Stir until dissolved, Add syrup and condensed milk. Stir occasionally until it comes to the boil, Continue to stir for about 15 mins or until it comes away from the side of saucepan. Poor into slice tin lined with baking paper, cool in tray and cut when still slightly warm and set.
